# Service as Culture

In 1953, economist Howard Bowen published his book, "Social Responsibilities of the Businessman," in which he is credited with coining the term corporate social responsibility (CSR) as we know it today. His message was clear: business leaders have an obligation to consider people when making decisions, not just profits. And as is often the case, it would take decades for the term to become mainstream.

When founders Norm Brownstein, Jack Hyatt, Steve Farber and Frank Schreck opened their firms in 1968, a commitment to community was already woven into their approach. More than five decades, 700 employees and countless community investments later, that spirit has only grown.

Today, giving back takes many forms. Our attorneys provide pro bono legal support to organizations and individuals who would not otherwise have access to quality representation, from counsel for nonprofit partners to legal clinics for low-income community members. Employees across the

firm show up through Karma projects, lending their time and energy to the communities that need it most. And we all do it together. Regardless of how we show up, we're all in.

When we give back, the impact goes beyond the individual. **We provide hope, generate momentum, and leave communities better than we found them.** And as the world changes, so does our approach.

# Executive Leadership Goals

Service becomes an integral part of a culture when everyone witnesses it in action and we treat giving back as a shared responsibility across the firm. When leaders lend their time and expertise through active community service and pro bono support, they set the tone for our entire organization and inspire ripple effects that extend beyond our offices. In 2025, we formalized what had always been part of our culture, asking every leader to take an active role in giving back. The response was unanimous.

HERE ARE A FEW WAYS MEMBERS OF OUR EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE SHOWED UP IN 2025:

**RICH BENENSON** negotiated a settlement agreement related to the **Taylor Ranch** trespass suit. This work was initiated by The Colorado Lawyers Committee (CLC), a nonpartisan coalition of nearly 80 law firms in Colorado dedicated to creating opportunities for children and underserved communities through pro bono legal advocacy, negotiation and litigation.

**AL MOTTUR** provided public policy guidance to **A Wider Circle**, an organization promoting equity in greater Washington, D.C. They facilitate the exchange of goods, skills and connections among neighbors, while also engaging in advocacy to address the root causes of poverty.

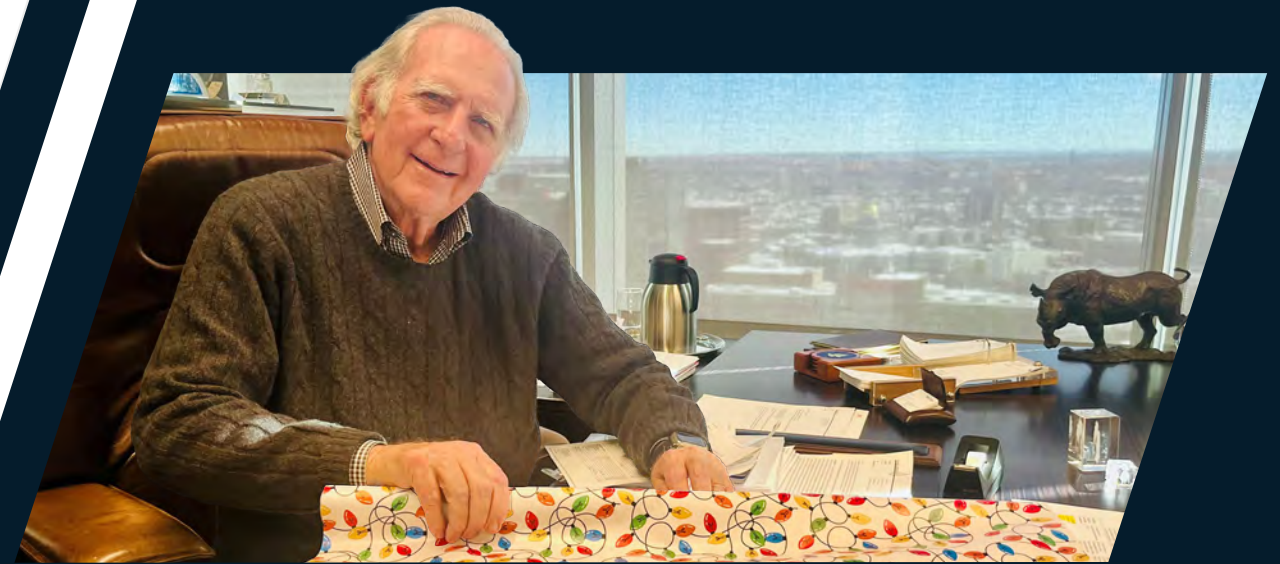
**NICOLE AMENT** supported the **Lakota Way Healing Center**, an organization focused on helping individuals dealing with trauma, addiction, homelessness, illness and PTSD by utilizing Indigenous Native American spirituality. She also contributed to the **Kempe Children's Foundation**, which invests in people and programs that foster better futures for children.

**GINO MAURELLI** advised **Columbia Community Care** on a potential joint venture. This nonprofit is committed to supporting individuals and families throughout Howard County, Maryland, with food assistance and community programs.

**DAVID COHEN** met with the executive director of **ALIGHT** to provide insights on their Backpage remission program. ALIGHT, accredited by Guidestar/Candid, connects survivors of human trafficking with free legal assistance during critical points in their recovery and has received recognition from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology (MIT) Solve program.

**JONATHAN PRAY** provided guidance on lease termination for the **Justice and Mercy Legal Aid Center**, which seeks justice for people struggling with poverty and oppression in a way that affirms the client's dignity and strengthens their capacity to positively direct their own lives.

**STEPHANIE HASTINGS** counseled a coalition of large landowners regarding issues involving the **Blue Sky Sustainable Living Center**. The center's mission is to strengthen rural communities within the Cuyama Valley by supporting entrepreneurs and developing regional creative and economic resources.

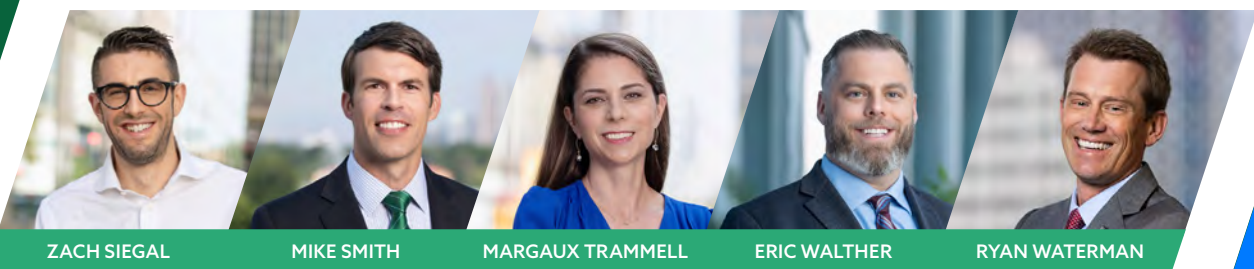

# Pro Bono Initiatives

From standout legal support to firmwide initiatives and partnerships, here's a look at some of the contributions that earned Brownstein a place among the country's top-ranked pro bono firms.

## ROCKY MOUNTAIN ARTS (RMA)

RMA is a nonprofit that brings public art and free community gathering spaces to rural towns across Colorado. When a community art and gazebo project stalled, members of the Brownstein team stepped in. They reviewed critical agreements, navigating a signed Memorandum of Understanding, and worked with local stakeholders to resolve construction and location issues that had brought progress to a halt. Through our involvement, RMA reengaged local youth to complete the gazebo, giving the community a permanent, free gathering space built by and for the people who needed it most.



## CAMPUS FOR HOPE

Campus for Hope is a much-needed response to a growing crisis in Southern Nevada. The proposed facility will offer stable shelter and wraparound services, including addiction recovery, job training, life skills programs, child care and job placement, helping residents regain stability and transition into permanent housing. A cross-practice Brownstein team, led by Jamie Thalgott, has dedicated over 200 hours to making this campus a reality. From drafting key agreements, supporting legislative funding efforts and securing statutory exemptions during Nevada legislative sessions, the team has been managing this complex work to bring this project to life.



## ONE COLORADO

One Colorado is dedicated to maintaining and advancing legal protections for LGBTQ+ individuals across Colorado. That work requires countless hours of litigation, advocacy and casework—and a legal team willing to show up for it. A team of Brownstein attorneys and staff has been instrumental in those efforts. From amicus briefs on high-profile cases to nonprofit collaborations, their work has earned national recognition and reflects the firm's deeper commitment to civil rights advocacy.



## COZY POINT RANCH

The Regenerative Agriculture Learning Center at Cozy Point Ranch is a new facility built by and for the community—a place to celebrate the local harvest and serve as a gathering space for learning, restoration and connection. Members of the Brownstein team were there from the start, supporting negotiations with the city, major property purchases, complex real estate and infrastructure logistics, and the formation of crucial community partnerships that helped turn years of vision into something real. When the project broke ground, beavers returned to the wetlands: a living sign that we made a tangible difference far beyond the legal work.



## MYSPARK

When the Denver Public Schools (DPS) Foundation set out to acquire MySpark, a program dedicated to equitable access to after-school enrichment for students and working families, they needed more than legal support. They needed a team that could see the deal through from start to finish. A team of Brownstein corporate and business attorneys did exactly that, applying their skills to every stage of the acquisition and helping secure stable funding to keep the program running for those who depend on it.

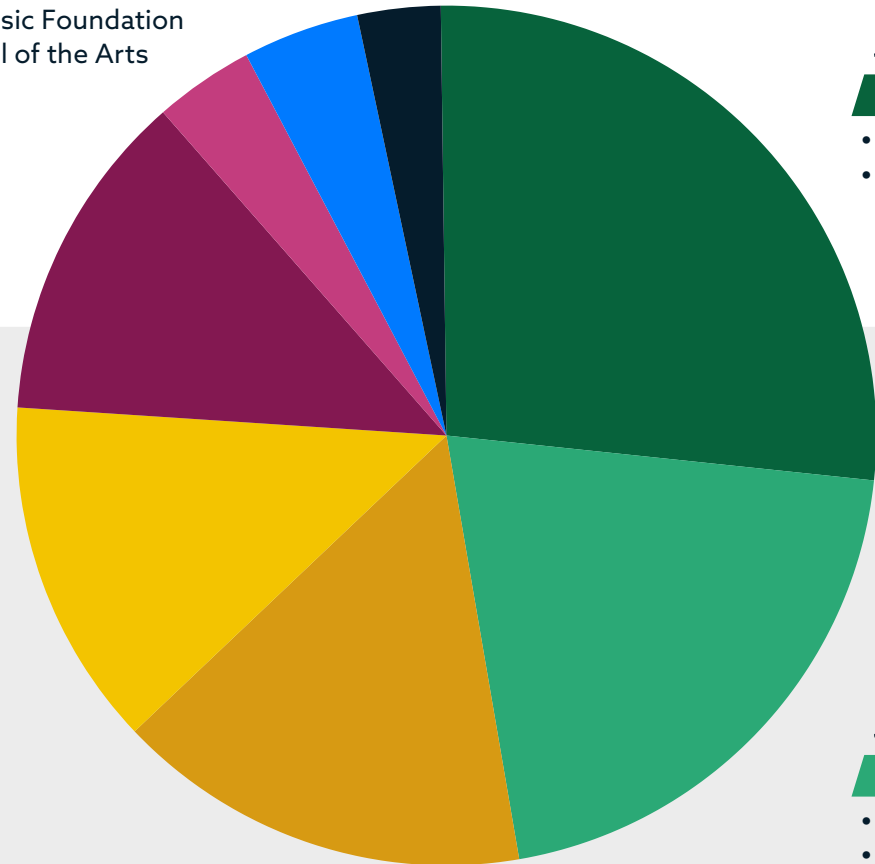

## JANUARY

Brownstein ranked No. 7 out of 20 organizations on the Denver Business Journal's Corporate Philanthropists list, as the only law firm to appear on the list.

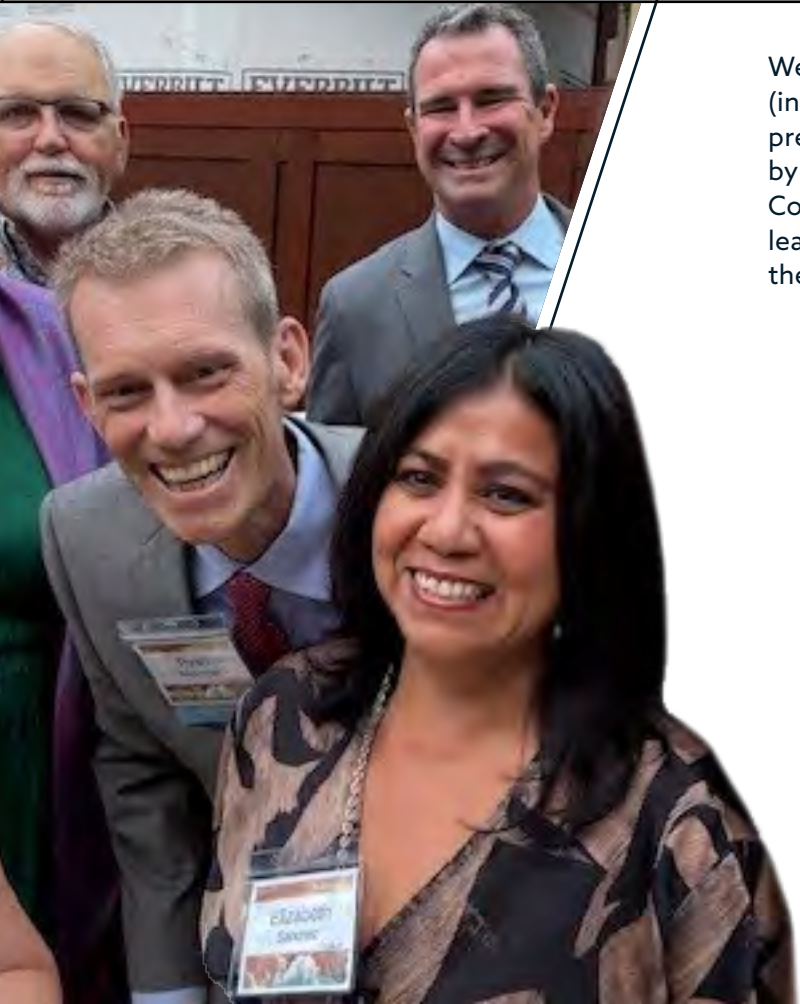
Our Denver office was recognized with the Legal Services Corporation (LSC) Pro Bono Service Award for its commitment to expanding access to justice through Call4All.
